3rd January 2010.

Glendevon to Dollar.

8.45am from Alyth.

9.00am from Blairgowrie.

There are options for all levels of through walks starting at various points in Glendevon and all ending up in Dollar.

24th January 2010.

Glen Clova/Glen Doll.

8.00am from Blairgowrie.

8.15 from Alyth.

There is the option of a through walk over Driesh and Mayer, or a circuit from Rotal Lodge and Loch Brandy both ending up at the Clova Hotel, or a shorter walk starting and finishing at the Clova Hotel climbing up to Loch Brandy and back.

14th February 2010.

Glen Falloch.

7.45am from Alyth.

8.00am from Blairgowrie.

There are numerous options in this area for all level of walks. Suggested routes include a climb to the summit of An Caisteal, or to the top of the Corbett Meall An Fhudair, or a low level walk along The West Highland Way from Crianlarich to the Inverarnan Inn.

7th March 2010.

Glas Maol/Glenshee.

7.45am from Alyth.

8.00am from Blairgowrie.

The suggested "A" walk starts at the Ski Centre, climbing over Glas Maol and Creag Leacach ending up at the Spittal of Glenshee. The "B" walk is a shorter route summiting on Carn Aosda and finishing at the Ski Centre and the "C" walk is suggested as route to the summit of Ben Gulabin and ending up in the Spittal of Glenshee.

Winter walking.

Members will be aware that the Club rules dictate that if members are intending to climb to the higher summits in winter conditions that they should carry and be able to use an Ice Axe as a minimum requirement, but preferably also carry and be able to use crampons. If unable to do so then the members are encouraged to consider alternative lower level walks.

Two go Furth.

("No problem at all"- apart from a few hiccups.).

Most members of the general public are aware of the "Munro's", Scotland's 3000ft. mountains, and of the challenge to climb to the summit of these 283 summits and therefore become Munroist's. Few however will be aware of the further challenge to complete an assent of the peaks in England, Wales and Ireland sometimes referred to as 'Furth of Scotland'. It is generally accepted that to be recognised as completing the Furth's, that there are four mountains in England, fourteen in Wales and eight in Ireland which need to be conquered.

Having both previously completed the Munro's, and most of the Furths, Terry Lonsdale and I set out with a plan in August to complete this challenge together with a support crew.

Flights, transport and accommodation were arranged and off the group set in the "wee sma' hours" on 27th August. Our first hiccup came at Dublin Airport where I had booked a hire car, only to be told that the company I had hired from had "no cars" and was passed on to another company.

Our first and second night stays were booked at Glendalough International Hostel in the Wicklow Mountains which was to be our base to complete our second last 'Furth', Lugnaquillia. Our second hiccup came when the warden of the Hostel told us we had no booking and that the Hostel was booked by a private group. However after a mild mannered protest, our hosts were able to find us the accommodation we had booked.

The third hiccup for me arrived on the morning of the day planned for Lugnaquillia, when a fairly severe bout of food poisoning left me unable to join the group for the day and meant that I missed out on a fine day to the highest point in The Wicklow Mountains.

On day three the group travelled to The Galty Mountains in central Ireland close to Tipperary where our target was Galtymore which had now become Terry's last of the Furth's and my second last. After eventually finding the access road leading to the hills, an easy climb in near perfect conditions was a fitting end to Terry's challenge and the customary celebration was carried out on the summit.

Our accommodation for that evening was in the eeriest building I have ever had the 'pleasure' to spend a night, Foulksrath Castle near Kilkenny, with its never ending spiral stone stair case to the top floor dorm, the haunting organ 'music' and the Baronial Dining room, which all added to the atmosphere of this allegedly haunted Castle.

An early start on our last day allowed for enough time to travel back to the Wicklow mountains for half of the group, who for their second time in three days and my first time ever, to ascend to the summit of Lugnaquillia, thus completing my round of the Furth of Scotland Mountains. I was not blessed with the fine day Terry had had the good fortune to get for his completion. I was 'lucky' enough to get mist and heavy rain. At least my companions on the day were able to tell me what the views had been like two days previous! A leisurely return to Dublin and flights home rounded off a successful trip for both Terry and
